



Marshall J. Orloff, MD

Marshall J. Orloff, M.D., is Distinguished Professor of Surgery, Emeritus, and Founding Chair of the Department of Surgery, Emeritus, at the University of California, San Diego (UCSD). He has been a member of the UCSD School of Medicine faculty for 45 years. In June 1965, Dr. Orloff accepted the position of Chair of Surgery at UCSD. He was the first faculty member and first departmental chair appointed to the UCSD School of Medicine and was one of the founders of the medical school.

Marshall Orloff was born in Chicago, Illinois, on October 12, 1927. He received B.S., M.S., and M.D. degrees from the University of Illinois, all with high honors, and was a Ph.D. candidate in pharmacology at the University of Colorado. He was the valedictorian of each of the graduating classes of which he was a member. He served an internship at the University of California, San Francisco, and a residency in general surgery and in thoracic surgery at the Hospital of the University of Pennsylvania. He also served research fellowships in pharmacology and in surgery, and was a trainee of the National Cancer Institute. His residency was interrupted by a two-year stint in Germany in the U.S. Army Medical Corps. He has been certified by the American Board of Surgery and the Board of Thoracic Surgery.

Dr. Orloff's first full-time academic post was as an Assistant Professor of Surgery at the University of Colorado, where he was honored by being made a Markle Scholar in Medical Science. In 1961, at the age of 34, he was made Professor of Surgery at UCLA School of Medicine and Chief of Surgery at Harbor General Hospital. At Harbor General, he recruited a faculty of young surgeons, four of whom subsequently became chairmen of departments of surgery at major universities. During his tenure at Harbor General, he was offered the position of chairman of surgery at Yale University, University of Chicago, Columbia University, and University of Texas, but he elected to accept the position at the new and very promising UCSD. He was 37 years old when he accepted the Chair of Surgery at UCSD, the youngest surgical chair in the United States.

Marshall Orloff has received many honors. He has received honorary doctorates and professorships from universities in Korea, Greece, and Sweden. He has received the outstanding teacher award at universities of Pennsylvania, Colorado, UCLA, and 8 times at UCSD. He has been given honorary membership in 13 national surgical societies in the USA and abroad. He has been elected to membership in 55 professional and scientific societies, and has served on numerous editorial boards of scientific journals, including serving as founder and Editor-in-Chief of World Journal of Surgery. He has been invited to lecture and serve as visiting professor 254 times at 90 universities in the USA and abroad. He was honored recently by the over 200 former surgical residents whom he trained--by establishment of the M.J. Orloff Family Endowed Chair of Surgery to be awarded in perpetuity to the Chair of the UCSD Department of Surgery.

Dr. Orloff's research activities have been among the most productive of his endeavors. He competed for and was awarded continuous NIH grant support from 1956 to 2004, amounting to approximately \$22 million. His research and clinical studies have resulted in 408 publications in peer-reviewed scientific journals and books. He is widely known for his contributions in liver physiology and disease, portal hypertension, diabetes, liver transplantation, pancreas transplantation, gastrointestinal disease, cancer, metabolism, immunology, disease of bile ducts and gallbladder, pancreatic disease, medical education, and morbid obesity.

Marshall and Ann Stuart Orloff, M.D., of Palo Alto, California, were married in 1953, and they have been married for 63 years. She is Clinical Professor of Radiology, Emeritus, at UCSD. The Orloffs have six children, three sons and three daughters. Three of their children are professors of surgery, one is a juvenile defense attorney, one a high school teacher, and one a research medical social worker and rehabilitation counselor. The Orloffs have lived in the same home in La Jolla, California, for over 50 years.

Dr. Eberlein is the Bixby Professor of Surgery and Professor of Pathology and Immunology at Washington University of Medicine in St. Louis. He is also the Chairman of the Department of Surgery and the Surgeon-in-Chief at Barnes-Jewish Hospital. Dr. Eberlein's other appointment is that of Director of the Siteman Cancer Center at Barnes-Jewish Hospital and Washington University Medical Center.

Dr. Eberlein graduated summa cum laude from the University of Pittsburgh and cum laude from the University of Pittsburgh School of Medicine. He was trained at Peter Bent Brigham Hospital, serving as chief resident. Later, he completed research and clinical fellowships at the National Cancer Institute (NIH).

Dr. Eberlein has been very active in the work of the National Cancer Institute, having served on the Board of Scientific Counselors and been a Chairperson for NIH Study Sections in the past. He has served as President of the Society of Surgical Oncology, President of the American Surgical Association, the Southern Surgical Association and the Society of Surgical Chairs. Dr. Eberlein serves on a number of editorial boards of peer reviewed journals and is currently the Editor-in-Chief of the Journal of the American College of Surgeons and Associate Editor of Annals of Surgical Oncology.
