Letter from the Chair

Dear Colleagues and Friends of the Department,

It is hard for me to believe that another calendar year has passed and the first month of the new year is ending. I want to first relay our deepest sympathies to the victims of the numerous fires in Southern California. Many of us have friends and colleagues whose lives have been significantly disrupted by the fires, and our heart goes out to them. The holidays, recent elections and transitions and other world events have made it challenging to pause and reflect on the year's many accomplishments in the Department of Surgery.

As always, I am happy to share a sampling of the impactful work you help support with your resources and interest in this newsletter.

This month's Q&A and feature article highlight important and novel work undertaken to improve the lives of our residents. For those who may not know, training to become a surgeon is arduous. The knowledge base, technical skills and clinical experience required to be an effective surgeon take many years to acquire. These five to six years are filled with long workweeks that frequently stretch to 80 hours. While the health of our residents and patients is the primary concern, workweeks exceeding 80 hours violate regulatory guidelines and place the program at risk.

Efforts to minimize unnecessary time in the hospital have historically been quite difficult for surgical training programs. To address the root causes of excessive work hours and improve the wellness of our residents, our team utilized essential quality improvement tools that are standard in the business environment. In an article published in the premiere surgical journal JAMA Surgery, this team, led by Jeff Reeves, M.D., Garth Jacobsen, M.D., and myself, demonstrated that the novel use of these tools can lead to sustained improvements in hospital work environments.

In light of this new publication, we spoke to Jeff Reeves, M.D., an author on this paper and fellow in the Division of Minimally Invasive Surgery, for our monthly Q&A. Reeves describes how this project came to be, why this work is so valuable and his hopes for the future. We are also pleased to share a number of new awards and other announcements in the pages that follow.

As always, we appreciate your interest and support, which facilitate our collective successes.

In honor of National Mentorship Month, the department spoke to Jennifer Berumen, M.D., about her full circle mentee to mentor experience.




Humans of Surgery
